Message from the Pastor.....

"Church Online"

It seems that each week that passes I do more and more of my sermon preparation online. For years my favorite website for Bible related study has been The Text This Week (<u>www.textweek.com</u>). This site is a compendium of links to other websites based on that week's series of lectionary texts. From the site you can move on to other people's sermon notes and commentaries written hundreds of years ago or yesterday. There are also links to drama, music, and art that relates to the given texts.

There are literally new sites each week, and some of them are worth paying attention to. Here's an informative and entertaining link that explains Ash Wednesday and Lent in two minutes: <u>http://bustedhalo.com/video/ash-wednesday-in-two-minutes</u>.

I also find myself spending more time with online religious communities. New online networks are growing daily, focused on exciting and viable new ways to communicate a 21st century version of the Christian faith. One I have spoken of before. It's the group known as Progressive Christianity. We currently buy our children's Christian Ed materials through the Center for Progressive Christianity. The site contains essays by many different writers about an emerging interpretation of Christianity that dovetails with many of our perspectives here at South Church. From their site you can look for progressive churches in your area. We are one of five churches that pop up when you search "Illinois." We have had visitors come to South Church after finding us on the Progressive website.

Another site I'd recommend is that of Episcopal Bishop, teacher, and prolific author, John Shelby Spong. Some of his earlier books helped me decide that there might be a place for me in the world of Christianity. (See *Rescuing the Bible from Fundamentalism* and *Liberating the Gospels*.) Spong's site features many short, well-indexed essays on topics of contemporary interest. You can sign up for a weekly email from the site called *Q & A*, where Bishop Spong answers questions that have been emailed to him. His work is a great guide and comfort to those of us who are searching for ways to create a Christianity that is relevant, evolving, and compatible with the discoveries of modern science. GETTING TO KNOW YOU.... 100 YEARS OF ZANOBIA IRWIN

"The first thing everyone always asks me," Zanobia says with a smile, "is where I got my unusual name. I don't want to be rude and say 'My parents gave it to me,' so I tell them my mom had a friend who read a book by Nathaniel Hawthorne and there was a character named Zenobia. My mother was intrigued by that and changed the spelling to Zanobia." She adds that Zenobia comes from a Greek word meaning 'having life from Jupiter.'

Zanobia is certainly full of life! She will celebrate her 100th birthday on February 28. Her philosophy of life is "Enjoy your family.....that's what makes it all worthwhile."

Born in Washington County, Indiana near Beck's Mill, Zanobia was the fifth of seven children. Her father was a blacksmith and her mother a homemaker. The family lived in Indiana until Zanobia was four years old. "My mother watched three of her siblings die of tuberculosis," she remembers. She said Indiana was beautiful, but damp and woody, so the family moved by railroad to the "new" state of Oklahoma. The high plains were quite a contrast to southern Indiana, she said. It was a dry prairie but no one suffered from tuberculosis.



Zanobia's father died young from diabetes. Her three older siblings moved on and the rest of the family lived through the terrible times of the Dust Bowl and the Depression. Her mother developed asthma so the family moved once again, this time to Boulder, CO.

She earned bachelor's degree from the University of Colorado in Boulder, and graduated Phi Beta Kappa with a major in English and English literature, grammar and mathematics. Zan taught for 10 years in Oklahoma and Colorado, the she married her husband Everett and moved to the Midwest.

Everett was a journalist and worked as a night editor for United Press, which later become United Press International (UPI). The two met through mutual friends in 1941. The couple visited all 50 states together, but her favorite place is still the Rocky Mountains. They had one daughter, Linda, who lives in Ely, MN, and their marriage produced five grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren. Most of the family lives nearby, and Zan enjoys spending time with everyone.

Zanobia and Everett started attending The South Church when Linda was young. He served on the Board of Deacons and Zan taught Vacation Bible School. "It was the only Protestant church in town," she recalls. Mount Prospect was a very different village in the early 1950s, but Zanobia loved it then and still loves it now. "This area was a prairie," she said, "and with the post-war boom, the village and the school system just burst out!"


She should know about the school system in Mount Prospect – Zanobia was a teacher here for 34 years, 24 of those at Lincoln Junior High School, which is just down the street from her home. Quite a few South Church members, including Trina Bryant, Lisa Zwilling and Mary Faith Weiss, had "Mrs. Irwin" as their teacher.

Zanobia says she "has no spare time" and is obviously not slowing down as she hits the century mark. She reads a lot, plays piano, bicycles 5 miles a day on her stationary bike, and spends quality time with her family. Her home is filled with beanie babies, roosters, Hummel figurines, family pictures, cardinal statuettes and refrigerator art – mementos of a full and joyful life. She is lovingly known in her family as "Grandma Honey."

When asked about some of the "good" changes she's noticed through her life, Zanobia said, "People are friendlier today." The "not so good" change she's noticed is increased gang activity, not just in Mount Prospect, but in general. Zan doesn't use a computer or a cell phone, but still thinks they are wonderful technological tools.

After Everett died in 1951, Zanobia and other South Church widows formed the Ring of Friendship, a social group of 18 widows who met once a month. They formed a very

strong bond. The group now has five members. Though small in numbers, they are mighty in spirit; her church friends threw her a birthday party last Sunday. Zanobia has made a conscious choice to be cheerful and positive in her life. "Of course I'm still happy," she smiles. "Why wouldn't I be?"
